Matters arising	<p>Hillcrest Residential Care Home. Since the last Locality Planning meeting David Kiltie has written to Kenny Leinster (5th August) expressing concerns around the review of Hillcrest residential care home in Girvan. David's letter sought clarity on the timeframe and consultation framework for the upcoming review.</p> <p>It was noted that the Locality Planning Group has working party status and a function as a consultative body within South Ayrshire Health and Social Care partnership and would expect to be named as a consultative body in this review process.</p> <p>Dementia Presentation. The group discussed Rachel McLeod's input on dementia which took place at the previous locality Planning meeting. While everyone agreed that the information provided was informative and highly relevant to the Locality Planning Groups priorities, some felt that the input pressurised other parts of the agenda. The group discussed the role of Locality Planning sub groups / short life working groups in relation to the role of the wider Locality Planning group and how best to undertake the tasks required of locality planning groups while ensuring all group members are furnished with relevant information.</p>	Dawn circulate Letter to Locality Planning Group members

The aim of the Active Travel Hub is to encourage the communities of South Ayrshire to undertake a modal change from the use of private cars and choose healthier, cleaner and cheaper journeys which have a knock-on benefit for the environment.</p> <p>The role of Community Transport has become increasingly critical in the design and delivery of practical transport solutions for providing access to services and facilities. Its role is particularly important for older people, the disabled, young people, those on low incomes and those living in rural communities with minimal (or no) public transport provision.</p> <p>Catriona shared a flyer outlining excursions and asked group members to share around their networks.</p> <p>The group discussed the recent North Carrick community transport survey and report of the findings with Catriona. David Kiltie expressed disappointment that the report did not identify in more detail the steps which would be taken to address the community transport needs i.e. number and types of vehicles required alongside costings.</p> <p>Catriona believes it is the role of the community to identify the needs and for SACT to respond to this.</p> <p>All agreed that the results of the community survey consolidate what we anecdotally know about the transport gaps in North Carrick for example; There is a lack of disabled accessible vehicles and an opportunity to develop a volunteer car scheme in North Carrick (2 small volunteer car schemes currently operate in South Carrick these are CAN (community Action Network) Girvan and BRICC Ballantrae.</p>	
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<p>Subgroup Activity-feedback</p> <p>Developing a listening Culture</p>	<p>Developing a Listening Culture</p> <p>At the previous Listening sub group it was agreed that there were 4 main elements to the developing of a 'listening' in North Carrick</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Extension/ development of Community Chaplaincy Listening (CCL) 2. Bereavement support 3. Listening support for children and young people 4. Developing a listening culture <p>1.Extension/development of Community Chaplaincy Listening</p> <p>Phil White and Judith Huggett are working on developing a proposal to develop the chaplaincy listening towards a community listening service across Carrick. This has been raised at the GP cluster meeting of which Dr Johnathon Sheward is the cluster lead for GPs across the Carrick Cluster. Bereavement Support</p> <p>Ian is exploring the option of running a bereavement programme 6 week programme (Stepping Stones). A future action may be to map the services groups that currently deal with bereavement across Carrick</p> <p>3. Listening support for children and young people</p> <p>The group recognised from earlier discussions with Ronnie Sinclair that there was a need to explore the development of listening support for children and young people. This also links to the possibility of rolling out Children 1st s 'It Takes a Village to Raise a Child'</p> <p>4.Developing a listening culture</p> <p>There are many possibilities linked to the development of listening culture at a local level i.e. making Maybole a Listening Town or North Carrick a 'Listening Locality' with each village imprinting its own identity on what it means to be a listening community.</p> <p>Could we create a festival of listening linked to the community</p>	<p>Dawn distribute flyer to Group</p>
