Updates February Decision Day Feedback	<p>Over 600 people turned out to vote, really good turnout- busiest yet across South Ayrshire. 31 groups took part, with 26 groups fully funded and 5 groups not funded. First time in Troon that some groups have not received funding - very few negative comments on this. £30 has been offered to each of the unsuccessful groups to help towards expenses for attending the event. At the moment this is predominantly a social work drop in with wider advice and signposting. We do have the opportunity to invite local community groups and services to be part of this but this would require further discussion. We can book other spaces/rooms within Walker Hall to complement this and develop further. A Troon Connect leaflet will be available soon. 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<p>101 Medical Practice update</p> <p>Phil White, South Ayrshire Health and Social Care Partnership Facilitator and Pam Milliken, Head of Primary Care and Out Of Hours Services</p>	<p>Phil and Pam thanked the group for inviting them along. They provided an overview/background on 101 Medical Practice developments.</p> <p>Key points</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Difficulties other GP Practices are facing - similar situation in Maybole but the support provided helped and they are now stable - the same support was offered to 101 • 2 GP's are retiring and 2 were anxious about staying on. There were also difficulties in recruiting. This culminated in handing back their contract • The Health Board could have taken over; transfer across and run the practice. This would involve bringing in locum doctors, which can be very transient (not duty bound to do additional or varying hours). We have tried to bring locums in but not enough GP's/locums were interested • The other 2 local practices expressed an interest in supporting the patient groups. This would provide better continuity of care for patients and improve recruiting prospects, (much harder to recruit locums). <p>Questions</p> <p>Q. Was there an option looked at to keep the Practice building going with nursing staff, for example?</p> <p>R. There are problems with split practices - very fluid support and working from different buildings is difficult. Grant McHattie's practice does have more space available and Templehill would add an extension.</p> <p>Q. How can you not recruit? It's taking a risk running only 2 Practices. The extension has not yet been granted planning permission. There's not been much time to recruit since it was only September it happened. Could you not retain 101 Practice and put other Doctors in there until recruitment can be made? Waiting times are currently ridiculous, this will only lead to further waiting lists, can't see only 2 practices working.</p>	
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	<p>R. GP's don't generally work for Health Boards; they can earn more through their own practices and have more freedom in how they run their business. The new GP contract is changing over the next 3 years and this may bring changes.</p> <p>GP roles are constantly out to advert for permanent posts but there aren't enough salaried GP's to run this practice. Why would the other practices want to give away some of their resource to work in another practice. 101 Practice are only required to give 6 month notice period. We met with them straight away to try and put in support. If waiting times are an issue we would get feedback and try to help resolve. GP practices are under pressure, especially with the ageing population.</p> <p>Q. Will the patients be allocated by an alphabetical system? That may mean splitting families up. The other problem at Templehill Surgery is parking.</p> <p>R. Allocation will be done alphabetically and by address, cross checking will be carried out in relation to families/different names etc. If families/carers have been split they can swap. Patient's details can be shifted in bulk, this can be done quickly.</p> <p>Q. Some patients will have genuine reasons why they can't join a particular surgery; can they be dealt with beforehand?</p> <p>R. No, we would struggle with that but we would send a letter and be able to change after the fact. There are already exclusions and letters will be sent out and then families can get in touch.</p> <p>It would be useful to have the information to disseminate</p> <p>Phil offered to come along and do a presentation on the new GP contract at a future meeting.</p> <p>Richard thanked Pam and Phil for taking the time to come along.</p>	
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<p>Holiday Meals Programme in Barassie - Valerie Stewart, Community Planning Co-ordinator</p>	<p>Valerie provided some information on the Holiday Meals Programme that has been taking place in Ayr and Girvan and explained about the Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD) data zones.</p> <p>Some families struggle to provide meals in school holiday times, the programme has been piloted in Ayr and Girvan and has worked well. We are now intending to rollout to Barassie over the Easter period.</p> <p>We're not sure how we're going to do it yet and would like your feedback and suggestions on how best to roll this out.</p> <p>Peter asked if Valerie had made contact with Barassie Parent Council - Valerie responded that she hadn't but would be doing so.</p> <p>Due to time the meeting was brought to a close but Valerie was able to discuss this further with key group members after the meeting.</p>
