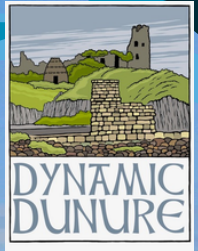

Dynamic Dunure

As part of the Dunure and Fisherton Community-led Action Plan, Dynamic Dunure is committed to working with residents, partners, and volunteers to support a strong, inclusive, and sustainable community.

Our focus is on four key areas that reflect what matters most to people living in and visiting Dunure and Fisherton.

Building a strong and active community: We aim to advance citizenship and community development by encouraging civic pride and helping residents build skills and confidence through volunteering, learning opportunities, and community-led activities.

Protecting and celebrating our heritage: Dunure and Fisherton's history and built environment are central to its identity. We will support the preservation of heritage assets and create new opportunities for residents and visitors to learn about and celebrate the villages' unique past.

Supporting recreation and community wellbeing: We will work to improve access to recreational facilities and organise activities that encourage people of all ages to come together through social, cultural, and recreational opportunities.

Caring for our environment: Protecting Dunure and Fisherton's natural environment is a priority, particularly our coastline. We will support action to reduce carbon emissions, use resources more responsibly, and encourage practical environmental initiatives led by the community.

Through these shared actions, Dynamic Dunure seeks to play a positive role in shaping a welcoming, resilient, and thriving Dunure and Fisherton, where local people are actively involved in the future of their community.



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About Dunure and Fisherton

Dunure and Fisherton are closely linked coastal communities with a rich maritime, cultural, and historic heritage.

Dunure, meaning 'fort of the yew tree', grew around its clifftop castle and harbour, with origins dating back to the 13th century. Over time, the village developed as a fishing community, shaped by its coastline, historic buildings, and strong sense of place.

Fisherton, located just northeast of Dunure, shares deep historical and social ties with the village. Landmarks such as Fisherton Parish Church, Dunduff Castle, and the local primary school continue to anchor community life, while the surrounding landscape reflects a much older history stretching back to prehistoric times.

Today, Dunure and Fisherton remain proud of their heritage and natural environment, which continue to define their character and identity. At the same time, the communities are looking ahead, working together to protect what makes the area special, while improving local facilities, strengthening community connections, and creating opportunities for future generations to live, learn, and thrive.

Community Engagement

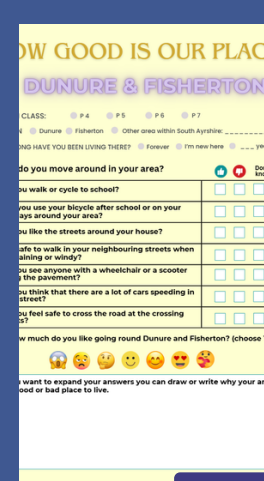
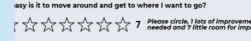
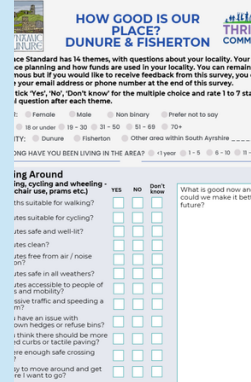
Community conversations in Dunure and Fisherton began in 2024, led by Dynamic Dunure, to help shape the next Community-led Action Plan alongside South Ayrshire Council.

To hear from as many people as possible, we used the Place Standard Tool and developed a survey, available both online and on paper, which asked questions across 14 different themes about life in the community.

We received 90 responses in total, including 21 from primary school children at Fisherton PS. The child-friendly version of the survey was shared with the P4 to P7 students to make sure that young people could have their say, as their views are an important part of planning for the future of Dunure and Fisherton.

In early 2025, Dynamic Dunure reviewed all the feedback and used it to develop clear actions for the Community-led Action Plan. The plan covers the next five years and includes: short-term actions (actions scheduled within the next year), medium-term actions (to be delivered over 1 to 3 years), and long-term actions (projects envisioned for the latter end of the plan).

The Dunure and Fisherton Community-led Action Plan also links closely with the South Ayrshire Council Plan, focusing on three shared priorities: Spaces and Places, Live, Learn and Work, and Civic and Community Pride.



What Residents and Young People Told Us

Residents and primary school pupils took part in the Place Standard Tool survey to share their views on life in Dunure and Fisherton, using a simple 1 to 7 scoring system.

Overall, the results show that people feel generally positive about the area, with most scores between 4 and 5, and children giving slightly higher scores than adults.

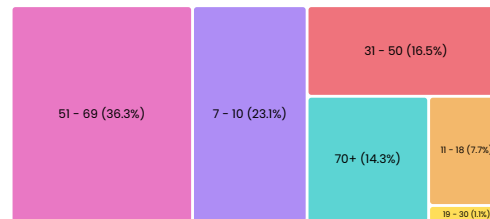
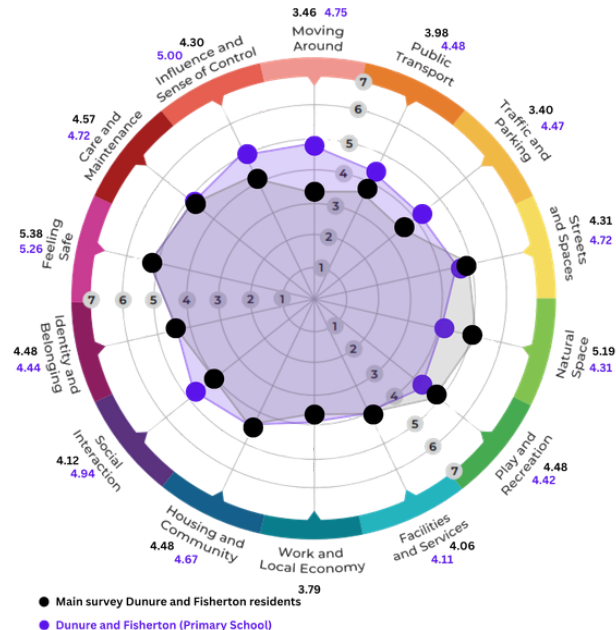
What's working well

- People feel safe, particularly children and young people.
- The natural environment and coastline are highly valued.
- There is a strong sense of community, identity, and pride in the area.

What could be improved

- Public transport, traffic, and parking were among the lowest-scoring areas for adults.
- Some residents feel there is limited access to facilities, services, and local opportunities.
- Moving around the area, including paths and accessibility, could be made easier for everyone.

These findings help identify what should be protected and where change is needed. They provide a clear starting point for the Community-led Action Plan, ensuring future actions are based on what residents and young people have told us matters most.

TERM

1. Ensure Dunure and Fisherton maintain a clean and healthy environment.

1.1 Improve reporting of fly-tipping. **Local groups** to work with **residents** to raise awareness of the importance of reporting fly-tipping, promoting the use of South Ayrshire Council's (SAC) website and phone reporting services.

Ongoing

1.2 Reduce litter in key locations. **Local groups** to liaise with SAC Neighbourhood Services and Grounds Maintenance to install a 'No Litter' sign at the Kennedy Park car park.

Short

1.3 Tackle dog fouling through awareness and enforcement.

Ongoing

1.3.1 **Local groups** to encourage responsible dog ownership through social media and other communication channels.

1.3.2 **Dynamic Dunure (DD)** to work with the SAC Environment and Trading Standards Team to support regular anti-dog fouling campaigns, including stencilling and signage.

1.4 **DD** to liaise with SAC and ARA to ensure regular inspection and maintenance of drainage infrastructure on Station Road. This proactive approach will help mitigate the increasing risk of flash flooding associated with climate change, particularly during more frequent and intense periods of heavy rainfall.

Short

2. Promote inclusivity by improving accessibility and walkability in Dunure and Fisherton.

2.1 Improve the safety and condition of key walking routes. Liaise with SAC and ARA to maintain and resurface the off-road path from Castle Road (locally known as 'the Hole in the Wall') leading towards Kennedy Recreational Park.

Short

2.2 Address pedestrian safety concerns at 'the Hole in the Wall'. Despite current restrictions on installing a pedestrian crossing at this location, **DD** will continue to pursue improvements by:

2.2.1 Maintaining ongoing discussions with ARA and SAC to address community safety concerns. Residents feeling unsafe when walking along the path and crossing the road to access the recreational park.

2.2.2 Requesting an on-site visit with relevant officers to assess possible alternative safety measures.

ACTIONS

2.2.3 Requesting that the recently introduced 20 mph speed limit is monitored and evaluated to assess its impact on pedestrian safety.

2.3 Support the development of safe walking and wheeling routes. **DD** recognises and supports the proposed Culzean Way as an opportunity to create a safe, accessible route for walking and wheeling, improving connectivity for residents and visitors.

2.4 Promote active travel across Dunure and Fisherton. **DD** seeks to ensure Dunure and Fisherton are included in active travel initiatives by exploring funding opportunities and working with partners to encourage walking and wheeling as part of everyday travel.

Did you know?

- Dunure harbour was significantly improved in 1811, helping the village grow into a thriving fishing community.
- Charles Rennie Mackintosh, the famous architect and designer, spent holidays in Dunure in the 1890s while studying at the Glasgow School of Art.

4.2 Ensure delivery and review of planned road safety measures. Continue engagement with ARA and the Head of Roads to monitor the implementation of traffic-calming and traffic-slowng engineering measures introduced in summer 2025. Review the effectiveness of these measures and identify any further actions required to improve road safety.

5. Ensure play and recreational facilities in Dunure and Fisherton meet the needs of all ages.

5.1 Review existing play provision. **DD** to liaise with SAC to review current play and recreational provision in Dunure and Fisherton, taking account of recommendations and priorities identified in the Play Sufficiency Assessment.

5.2 Support a child- and family-friendly approach. **DD** will support the inclusion of Dunure and Fisherton in the Play Charter, recognising the importance of play for children's health, wellbeing, and development.

5.3 Improve and reinstate play opportunities at Kennedy Drive Park. **DD** to liaise with SAC to explore the possibility of reinstating play provision at Kennedy Drive Park, considering options such as: natural play features, a small playpark or equipment, swings, biodiversity-friendly elements, such as landscaped banking to support wildlife (e.g. ladybirds). Any proposals will aim to balance play, nature, and the needs of the wider community.

6. Support education, learning, and social interaction for all ages.

6.1 Support youth provision. **DD** to liaise with SAC Community Learning and Development (CLD), to support the continuation of funding for staffing and organisation of the youth club during term time.

Ongoing

6.2 Secure sustainable funding for youth activities. **DD** to support applications for external funding and grants, alongside self-fundraising led by the youth group, to help cover the costs of events and weekly sessions.

6.3 Explore extended school-based support. Subject to sufficient funding, explore the potential for breakfast clubs and after-school sessions at Fisherton and Dunure Primary School, reflecting residents' expressed interest in additional family support.

7. Support local employment and economic opportunities.

ACTIONS

6.4 Strengthen community activities through The Helm project. Through The Helm project, **DD** will support local groups such as The Gathering to continue their current activities and, where possible, expand their offer using new and improved facilities.

6.5 Develop intergenerational activities. Following the completion of The Helm project, **DD** would explore the establishment and monitoring of intergenerational activities. If successful, investigate opportunities and funding options to expand these events and activities over time.

7.1 Create opportunities for local enterprise and skills development. **DD** recognises that while Dunure and Fisherton were historically supported by land/sea-based and manual work, many residents now seek employment outside the villages. Through The Helm project, support opportunities for residents to turn interests and skills into income, helping 'yearners become earners'. Potential opportunities may include:

- Event organisation.
- Local catering and food producers (including farm-to-fork makers).
- Floral design and creative enterprises.
- Nature-based and cultural activities, such as stargazing or heritage-led experiences.

7.2 Support employment linked to visitor growth and active travel. Subject to the completion of The Culzean Way, **DD** recognises the potential for increased visitor numbers to support new employment opportunities. These may include: bicycle repair and hire services, catering and hospitality offers, and small-scale tourism businesses. **DD** will seek to explore partnerships, funding, and training opportunities that help residents benefit from sustainable economic growth linked to the area's natural and cultural assets.

8. Improve sustainable transport options in a rural village setting.

Dynamic Dunure recognises that transport in rural villages can be challenging and will work to encourage sustainable, efficient, and accessible public transport options for residents of all ages.

ACTIONS

8.1 Improve bus connectivity to key services. Engage with Strathclyde Partnership for Transport (SPT) to explore the possibility of introducing a bus service between Dunure and Maybole at key times of the day, aligned with: school start and finish times, work commuting hours and after-school activities.

8.2 Understand local transport needs. Carry out a community consultation to assess demand for community transport provision and identify gaps in existing services.

8.3 Explore infrastructure changes to support public transport. Engage with SPT, ARA, and SAC to explore options for adapting infrastructure at Kennedy Drive to create a suitable turning point. This would include: requesting consideration of smaller buses and exploring the feasibility of adding a bus stop at the turning point.

8.4 Explore the feasibility of a community transport service. Subject to community feedback, investigate funding options and requirements for establishing a community transport scheme, including:

8.4.1 Acquiring accessible vehicle(s) suitable for all users, including those with additional mobility or accessibility needs, supported by a booking system.

8.4.2 Recruiting and training volunteer drivers, ensuring all necessary checks are in place (licensing, insurance, safeguarding, and training).

8.4.3 Securing sufficient funding to establish, operate, and maintain the booking system and ongoing transport service.

9.4.2 Encouraging collaboration between local groups and residents, and inviting all members of the community to connect with trustees, volunteers, or group members to explore how they can get involved.

Short

9.5 Explore future use of underused land and sites. Liaise with SAC teams to explore potential uses for land at the lock-up garage sites at either end of Carrick Place and the bus park (square), ensuring any future use supports community benefit.

9.6 Support biodiversity and community green spaces. Liaise with Neighbourhood Services (SAC) and South Ayrshire Ranger Services to explore the creation of community garden and/or any bio-diversity project(s) on land leading towards the dovecote and Dunure Castle, by:

9.6.2 Developing community-led projects that enhance the area through native planting, increased biodiversity, and involvement of residents, particularly children and young people.

9.7 Address stalled or problematic development sites. Work with partners to assess the abandoned Campbell Developments site by:

9.7.1 Identifying any outstanding actions that could improve or clear the site.

9.7.2 Liaising with Scottish Environment Protection Agency (SEPA) to explore potential solutions, including sewage or environmental considerations.

10. Maintain, celebrate, and promote the assets of Dunure and Fisherton.

10.1 Celebrate and promote local assets. DD recognise and promote Dunure and Fisherton's key assets, including the labyrinth, harbour, beach, sea views, castle, archaeological heritage, and the area's potential as a filming location, ensuring these are protected and celebrated for both residents and visitors.

10.2 Strengthen presence and promotion. Improve the visibility of local assets by:

10.2.1 Working with SAC to enhance information and content about Dunure and Fisherton on the Destination South Ayrshire website.

10.2.3 Applying for funding and grants to support the administration, maintenance, and ongoing development of the DD website and social media channels.

10.3 Build skills and partnerships through education and youth involvement. **DD** to link with local education providers such as Ayrshire College, Carrick Academy, and the University of the West of Scotland (UWS) to explore opportunities for young people to support digital, technical, and creative work as part of volunteering, learning, or placement opportunities.

10.4 Work in partnership to grow the local economy. Engage with SAC teams, including Thriving Communities, Community Wealth Building, Thriving Economy, to support coordinated efforts that celebrate and maximise the cultural, environmental, and economic assets of Dunure and Fisherton.

11. Enhance village assets, appearance, and community services.

11.1 Improve the look and feel of Dunure and Fisherton. **DD** recognises that the overall appearance of the villages plays an important role in community pride and visitor experience by:

11.1.1 Exploring the installation of planters and/or hanging baskets at key locations (to be agreed), helping to enhance streetscapes and public spaces.

11.1.2 Requesting SAC Neighbourhood Services to install “Welcome to Dunure” and “Welcome to Fisherton” signage at the main entrances to each village.

11.2 Maintain beautification projects. As an ongoing commitment, **local groups** will explore funding and grant opportunities to support the regular maintenance of planters and other village beautification projects.

11.3 Support youth services and summer activities. **DD** to maintain an open dialogue with SAC, and the CLD team to retain and where possible, improve summer schemes and youth provision, including: better signposting and promotion of activities, stronger links with local groups, and opportunities for a wider age range of young people (8 - 16 years).

11.4 Improve youth participation through better facilities. **DD** acknowledge that current participation levels may be limited by existing facilities. Subject to the completion of The Helm, the youth group would benefit from an improved venue and facilities, with the aim of: increasing participation and expanding the range and quality of activities on offer.

11.5 Maintain access to library services. **DD** will seek reassurance that the monthly SAC mobile library service will continue to serve Dunure and Fisherton, recognising its value to residents of all ages.

Short

12. Support safer communities and safer journeys.

12.1 Improve lighting and safety on key routes. Respond to residents' concerns about safety due to poor lighting between the Croft and Greengates by liaising with SAC and ARA to explore options to improve lighting and visibility. This may include the use of solar-powered pedestrian path lighting where appropriate.

12.2 Strengthen relationships with Police Scotland. **DD** will work with Police Scotland to build and improve relationships between the police and the Dunure and Fisherton communities.

12.2.1 Request more detailed and regular police reports for monthly Dunure and Fisherton Community Council meetings, including clearer descriptions of incidents where appropriate.

12.2.2 Explore with Police Scotland the possibility of re-introducing a dedicated community officer and/or increasing police presence in the villages, including regular or occasional visits to the primary school and youth club.

12.3 Promote inclusive and respectful volunteering. Commit to registering with and following the Volunteer Charter (Volunteer Scotland), and encourage other local groups to do the same. As a representative community organisation, **DD** will ensure that:

- Participation and communication are inclusive and respectful.
- All residents feel welcome to attend meetings and take part in community life.
- No one experiences discrimination in community activities or decision-making.

12. Continued.

ACTIONS

12.4 Support emergency preparedness and first response. **DD** to engage with South Ayrshire Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP) and other partners to explore the feasibility of establishing a local first responders' team within Dunure and Fisherton. This would support residents to feel confident and capable in emergency situations by:

12.4.1 Promoting awareness and training in CPR, first aid, and defibrillator use.

12.4.2 Making best use of existing defibrillators currently maintained by NCCBC.

12.5 Build skills and training within the community. **DD** to explore funding opportunities to ensure that local groups and organisations, including the youth club, can access appropriate first aid and defibrillator training.

12.6 Promote community safety and crime reporting. Encourage **residents** to report anti-social behaviour or crime through Crimestoppers, using either:

- The website: <https://crimestoppers-uk.org/give-information/forms/give-information-anonymously>
- Telephone: 0800 555 111

Emphasise that Crimestoppers is anonymous and works in partnership with Police Scotland to help keep communities safe.

12.7 Explore community-led safety initiatives. Consider the creation or re-establishment of Neighbourhood Watch schemes, led by residents and supported by local groups, to complement policing and promote community awareness.

12.8 Maintain and support defibrillator provision. **DD** to seek funding and support to ensure the ongoing supply, servicing, and maintenance of defibrillators located at:

- The harbour.
- Kennedy Park.
- The bus park.
- The school.

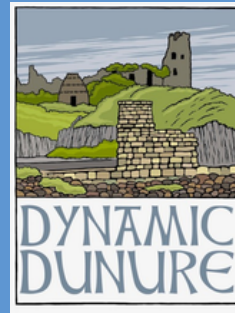
