Chair's Remarks

The Chair

- (1) welcomed everyone to the meeting; and
- (2) outlined the procedures for conducting this meeting and advised that this meeting would be broadcast live.

1. Sederunt and Declarations of Interest.

The Co-ordinator (Licensing) called the Sederunt for the meeting and having called the roll, confirmed that there were no declarations of interest by Members of the Panel in terms of Council Standing Order No. 17 and the Councillors' Code of Conduct.

2. Exclusion of press and public.

The Panel resolved, in terms of Section 50A(4) of the Local Government (Scotland) Act 1973, that the press and public be excluded from the following two items 5(a)(i) and 5(a)(ii) on the grounds that they involved the likely disclosure of exempt information in terms of paragraphs 6 and 14 of Part 1 of Schedule 7A of the Act.

3. Civic Government (Scotland) Act 1982 - Licences**Taxi Driver**

The Panel heard from the Co-ordinator (Licensing) who advised that the Chief Governance Officer had taken a decision to suspend the licence previously held by Mervin Waldapfel in terms of Paragraph 11(2)(a) and/or (2)(c) of Schedule 1 of the Civic Government (Scotland) Act 1982, due to the carrying on of the licensed activity is causing, or is likely to cause a serious threat to public safety and that the Panel were now requested to consider suspension of this licence in terms of Paragraph 12(1) of the Act.

The Panel then heard from Police Scotland and from the licence holder, Mervin Waldapfel in relation to the proposed suspension of the licence currently held by him, under Paragraph 12(1) of Schedule 1 of the Civic Government (Scotland) Act 1982.

The Panel

Decided: to suspend the licence currently held by Mervin Waldapfel immediately for its unexpired duration as, in their opinion, the licence holder is not, or is no longer, a fit and proper person to hold the licence and the carrying on of the licensed activity, is causing, or is likely to cause a serious threat to public safety.

2. Minutes of Previous Meeting of 30 April 2026

As Councillor Mackay was not in attendance at this meeting, he was not eligible to vote on these minutes.

The minutes of 30 April 2026 (issued) were submitted and approved.

3. Civic Government (Scotland) Act 1982 - Licences**(a) Taxi Drivers**

- (i) There was submitted a report (issued to Members only) by the Chief Governance Officer seeking Panel decision on whether to grant an exemption certificate to Brian Haddow for exemption of mobility assistance duties under the Equality Act 2010.

The Panel heard from the Co-ordinator (Licensing) and from the representative for the licence holder Brian Haddow in relation to his request.

The Panel

Decided: to approve the exemption from mobility assistance duties under Section 166 of the Act for the duration of his current licence and any subsequent licences.

- (ii) There was submitted a report (issued to Members only) by the Chief Governance Officer for Panel to consider the proposed suspension of the licence currently held by William Gibson.

In the absence of the applicant, the Panel

Decided:

- (1) to suspend the licence currently held by William Gibson in terms of Schedule 1, paragraph 11 of the Civic Government (Scotland) Act 1982 with immediate effect for its unexpired portion on the grounds that the carrying on of the activity to which the licence relates has caused, is causing or is likely to cause undue public nuisance or a threat to public order or safety; and
 - (2) to grant delegated powers to the Service Lead – Legal and Licensing to recall the suspension of the licence once the licence holder has provided evidence he meets Group 2 medical standards.
- (iii) Reference was made to the Minutes of 19 March 2026 (Page 2, paragraph 4(a)(ii)) when it had been decided to continue consideration of this matter to a future meeting of this Panel until the outcome of the court case was known. The Panel then heard from Police Scotland and from the licence holder, Palpinder Singh in relation to the proposed suspension of the licence held by him.

Five Members voted for the Motion and one Member abstained and the Panel

Decided: to suspend the licence for the remainder of its term with immediate effect on the grounds that Mr Singh is not or is no longer a fit and proper person to hold the licence and the carrying out of the activity to which the licence relates has caused or is likely to cause a threat to public safety.

- (iv) The Panel heard from the Co-ordinator – Licensing in relation to the application from Joe Berham.

The Panel

Decided: to note that this application had been withdrawn.

- (v) The Panel heard from Police Scotland and from the applicant, Murat Tatlici in relation to his application.

Five Members voted for the Motion and one Member abstained and the Panel

Decided: to approve this application for one year, subject to standard conditions as previously approved.

- (vi) Reference was made to the Minutes of 30 April 2026 (Page 3, paragraph 4(c)(ii)) when the Panel had decided, in the absence of the applicant, Daniel Crossan, to continue consideration of this application to a future meeting of this Panel to allow the applicant to attend in person.

In the absence of the applicant, the Panel

Decided: to refuse this application on the grounds that the applicant is not a fit and proper person to hold the licence.

**SUBJECT: ANNUAL INSPECTION AND SAFETY CERTIFICATES FOR THE
REGULATED STANDS AT AYR RACECOURSE**

1. Purpose

- 1.1 To advise the Panel of the outcome of the annual technical inspections at Ayr Racecourse, and to seek approval for the issue of revised Safety Certificates for the two stands.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that the Panel:

- 2.1.1 agrees that the current Safety Certificates remain in force until 30th June 2026, provided that no adverse reports are received at the meeting; and
- 2.1.2 agrees that the revised Safety Certificates will come into force on 1st July 2026, for the period of one year.

3. Background

- 3.1 Ayr Racecourse is covered by the provisions of the Fire Safety and Safety of Places of Sports Act 1987. Part III of the Act applies to sports grounds which provide covered accommodation in stands for spectators but are not designated sports grounds in terms of the Safety of Sports Grounds Act 1975. Safety Certificates require to be issued for grandstands ("regulated stands"), which provide covered accommodation for 500 or more spectators.
- 3.2 Main guidance is given in the "Guide to Safety of Sports Grounds", the ("Green Guide"). Although the guide has no statutory force, its recommendations can be made statutory by their inclusion in Safety Certificates.

- 3.3 Ayr Racecourse currently has two grandstands which are classed as regulated stands, the Princess Royal (also known as the Club Stand) and the Eglinton Stand.
- 3.4 It should be noted that the Safety Certificates cover only the grandstands, their associated entrances and exits and the concourses in front of the stands. The Racecourse is not classified as a designated Sports Ground under the 1975 Act. The certificates do not cover the Eglinton Rooms, Rothesay Stand, Paddock area etc.
- 3.5 The current Certificate remains in force until 30th June 2026, unless withdrawn by the Council.
- 3.6 The Safety Certificates states that all assessments, surveys, and reports required, should be completed by 28th February each year, with any remedial works carried out to the satisfaction of the Council by 31st May. It should be noted that additional inspections are carried out prior to the Scottish National meeting, normally held in mid-April and the Gold Cup held in September each year. Both of which attracts the largest attendances. There are also Safety Advisory Group (Stadia) meetings held prior to both these events and debriefs to learn any lessons learned.

4. Proposals

Technical Reports

4.1 Building Standards Services, South Ayrshire Council

- 4.1.1 The annual inspection was made to the Racecourse on 6th May 2026. It can be reported that all the required assessments, surveys, certification, and reports are now in place, including the Structural Certificate, which has been signed off after the 2026 Maintenance Programme has been completed.

The 2026 Maintenance Programme contained a number of minor items to be repaired, and these have been completed. Some of the ongoing issues highlighted within the structural report are outlined below.

- 4.1.2 The structural report submitted as part of the required assessments, highlighted concerns regarding the condition of the reinforced concrete structural frame to the Eglinton Grandstand. A series of record photographs were taken as part of the structural survey.

No immediate action is required in relation to safety, however there are works required to prolong lifespan of the structure. We are currently working with the racecourse management team and the safety officers to determine how the work to this area will be programmed.

It should be noted that there is no public access currently to the upper tier of the Eglinton grandstand, and as such the spectator numbers for this stand have been reduced. This area of the stand is not required generally during the year, due to the spectator numbers, and is not included within the capacities for the Safety Certificate.

There is no current proposal to utilise this area for viewing. If it was be used in the future then an amended Safety Certificate would be required to be issued, to include this area again within the approved spectators for the Eglinton Stand.

- 4.1.3 The Scottish Grand National meeting was held this year on 18th April 2026 and attracted an attendance of 15,010, and the Ayr Gold Cup meeting was held on the 20th of September 2025 with an attendance of 8,347. No adverse reports specifically in relation to the grandstands were received about either meeting.
- 4.1.4 The Contingency Plan and Evacuation Procedures were updated in March 2026. There have been some training exercises of the updated Plan throughout the year at some smaller race meetings. It has been scheduled to carry out a tabletop exercise to test the Multi-Agency Incident Response Guide (MAIRG) on the 23rd September 2026 at the Racecourse.
- 4.1.5 The Medical Plan for the Racecourse has been through a review with input from the NHS Ayrshire & Arran Resilience Team. The updated Medical Plan was signed off on 26th March 2026. The Medical Plan will be reviewed on an annual basis.
- 4.1.6 The Terrorism (Protection of Premises) Act 2025, also known as Martyn's Law, received Royal Assent in April 2025. There is an implementation period of at least 24 months, from 3 April 2025, before the Act comes into force and this is to give sufficient time for venues to understand their new obligations.

This legally requires sports stadia and major event venues to implement proportionate security and preparedness measures against terrorist threats on tiered approach, based on capacity.

Initial discussions have been held with Racecourse as to the obligations of this new legislation and how this relates to the Zone Ex requirements of the Green Guide. This will not affect the issuing of the Safety Certificate this year but will be included into the certificate issued on the 1st July, 2027.

It is proposed that further discussions on the requirements of the Legislation will be held through the Safety Advisory Group for Stadia (SAG).

An interim review of the Safety Certificate will be made against the Legislation and any amendments required will be incorporated into Safety Certificate that will be issued next year. If additional measures are required to be implemented prior to the issuing of the certificate a Temporary Certificate may be required to be issued.

Safety Advisory Group (Stadia)

- 4.2 This was the first year that the Safety Advisory Group (Stadia) and meetings were held during the certification process. Members of the SAG group attended a stadium inspection on the 6th May and the formal SAG to review the issuing of the Safety Certificate was held on 20th May 2026. All attendees were asked for any comments on the issuing of the Safety Certificate.

**SUBJECT: ANNUAL INSPECTION AND REVISED SAFETY CERTIFICATES
FOR SOMERSET PARK, AYR**

1. Purpose

- 1.1 To advise the Panel of the outcome of the annual technical inspection of Somerset Park, Ayr, and to seek approval for the issue of revised Safety Certificates for the ground.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 It is recommended that the Panel:
- 2.1.1 agrees that the current Safety Certificate remains in force until 30th June 2026, provided that no adverse reports are received at the meeting; and
 - 2.1.2 agrees that the revised Safety Certificate will come into force on 1st July 2026, and that it will include the new Regulated Stand to the North Area.

3. Background

- 3.1 Under the Safety of Sports Ground Act 1975 Somerset Park is designated as a ground requiring a General Safety Certificate. In addition to the Safety of Sports Grounds Act 1975 the ground is covered by the Fire Safety and Safety of Places of Sport Act 1987, and related Safety of Sports Grounds Regulations. Main guidance is given by the "Guide to Safety at Sports Grounds", (the "Green Guide"). Although the guide has no statutory force, many of its recommendations are made statutory by their inclusion in the General Safety Certificate.
- 3.2 Currently Somerset Park had a General Safety Certificate issued by South Ayrshire Council to Ayr United Football Club (AUFC). Under the terms of the Certificate AUFC are defined as "Holders" of the Certificate. The Certificate set the ground capacity of Somerset Park at 10,203.

- 3.3 The current Certificate is valid until 30th June 2026, unless withdrawn by the Council. The Safety Certificate states that all assessment, surveys and reports required should be completed by 28th February each year, with any remedial works carried out to the satisfaction of the Council by 14th July, prior to the beginning of the new football season.

4. Detail

Technical Reports

4.1 Building Standards Services, South Ayrshire Council

4.1.1 The annual site inspection was made to Somerset Park on 22nd April 2026. It can be reported that all the required assessments, surveys, certification, and reports are now in place. The annual Structural Report has been received by the Council along with required Structural Safety Certificate. Within the Report there is a number of maintenance works required and as such a schedule of works has been prepared and issued to AUFC for completion prior to 14th July 2026. A further inspection will be scheduled by Building Standards to confirm that all necessary works are completed by the 14th July 2026.

4.1.2 Major development works were carried out to the stadium with the completion of the new North Stand with seated area and hospitality suite to the rear in June 2024. The new North Stand and associated terracing to the front was included within the current Safety Certificate, issued on the 1st July 2024. This gave an amended ground capacity figure of 10,203.

4.1.3 The highest attendance in the 25/26 season was against Partick Thistle in the Championship, on the 4th April 2026 with an attendance of 3253.

Match day inspections were carried out at several games throughout the season as required by the Green Guide. This included a match against Dunfermline on the 31st October 2025 which was televised on BBC Scotland. There were no major home matches in the Cups that would have required a multi-agency meeting Safety Advisory Group (SAG) for Stadia to be held.

4.1.4 One of the challenges for Somerset Park is that access can currently only be gained from sets of turnstiles, on two sides of the stadium (Somerset Road & Tryfield Place). This was due to the land adjacent to the stadium on other two sides of ground not being owned by the Club.

The area adjacent to the Railway End of the stadium was purchased last year by the Club, who have recently carried out extensive development works. This includes a new training pitch with changing facilities, a gym, Padel courts and future proposal for a Wellness facility. Each of which have been or are required to go through the Planning and Building Warrant approval process.

Meetings have been held with the Club, and representations have been made to include additional turnstiles within any new proposed plans for this area. This would not only improve access to the Railway End but, could also facilitate away fans access to the North Stand area which is currently temporary closed off. The issue of additional turnstiles was also raised at the Safety Advisory Group meeting in May 2026. A further meeting is scheduled with the Club to discuss the overview of this area in more detail.

- 4.1.5 The Terrorism (Protection of Premises) Act 2025, also known as Martyn's Law, received Royal Assent in April 2025. There is an implementation period of at least 24 months, from 3 April 2025, before the Act comes into force and this is to give sufficient time for venues to understand their new obligations.

This legally requires sports stadia and major event venues to implement proportionate security and preparedness measures against terrorist threats on tiered approach, based on capacity.

Initial discussions have been held with Club as to the obligations of this new legislation and how this relates to the Zone Ex requirements of the Green Guide. An interim review of the Safety Certificate will be made against the Legislation and any amendments required will be incorporated into Safety Certificate that will be issued next year. If additional measures are required to be implemented prior to the issuing of the certificate a Temporary Certificate may be required to be issued.

4.2 Safety Advisory Group (Stadia)

- 4.2 This was the first year that the Safety Advisory Group (Stadia) and meetings were held during the certification process. Members of the SAG group attended a stadium inspection on the 6th May and the formal SAG to review the issuing of the Safety Certificate was held on 20th May 2026. All attendees were asked for any comments on the issuing of the Safety Certificate.
