### **Opening Remarks**

The Chair to the Licensing Board welcomed everyone to the meeting and outlined the procedures for conducting this meeting and advised that this meeting would be broadcast live.

#### 1. Declarations of Interest

There were no declarations of interest by Members of the Board in terms of the Councillors' Code of Conduct.

#### 2. Date of Next Board Meeting

The Chair advised that the next Board meeting would be held on Thursday 27 October 2022 at 10.00 a.m.

#### 3. Minutes of Previous Meeting

The Minutes of the Meeting of South Ayrshire Licensing Board of 24 August 2022 (issued) were submitted.

**Decided:** to approve the Minutes of the previous meeting.

#### 4. Update by Licensing Standards Officer

The Licensing Standards Officer advised:

- (1) that the Gold Cup race meeting at Ayr Racecourse had taken place last weekend which Board Members had attended on the Friday to observe the layout and how each area was staffed; and it had been positive to note that a number of requests and suggestions from consultation with the Premises Manager had been taken on board and new signage and information packs had been clearly visible;
- (2) that she had attended the Gold Cup race meeting on Saturday with Police Scotland and was pleased to report that no direct complaints had been received following the meeting;

- (3) that, as with the hospitality trade in general, staffing continued to be a challenge and she was aware that the Premises Manager was constantly considering the best approach for the future; and that she would continue to work with the racecourse in a positive way and would be involved in the early preparations for the Scottish National in 2023;
- (4) that, despite ongoing media reports regarding the financial challenges for the hospitality trade, she was pleased to report that new operators continued to open licensed premises in South Ayrshire and existing operators were keen to expand which was very positive; that there continued to be investment in licensed premises and, with many renovations, re-decorations, menu ideas and food offerings, there was a wide variety of choice available;
- (5) that the trade were approaching a traditionally quieter time in advance of the festive period and she had been advising operators and managers to use this time to ensure that staff training was up-to-date and met the legal requirements;
- (6) that operating plans must allow for any activities taking place within the premises and that she was aware that many businesses were currently in the process of making application to vary these in coming months to allow greater flexibility for the future; and
- (7) that as the past two years had changed many things within the hospitality trade and many operators remained unsure of what temporary legislation and requirements remained in force from licensing and other related legislation and departments, she was currently working with a local Police Inspector to organise an 'Information Event' for the trade pre-Christmas to allow her to provide information and support to the local licensed trade; and that she would advise the Board of the details for this event at the next Board meeting.

Having advised that the visit to Ayr Racecourse had proved very worthwhile and having commended the Licensing Standards Officer for organising the 'Information Event', the Board

#### **Foreword**

It gives me great pleasure to provide the Annual Licensing Report for 2021/22, in accordance with Section 12(A) Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005. Throughout this year Local Authorities and Police Scotland worked hard to support licensed premises in their road to recovery as Covid-19 restrictions were being lifted.

Collaboration is vital to ensure these businesses can flourish, providing much needed employment for our communities as well as a safe environments for people to socialise. Police Scotland will continue to work closely with Local Authorities, as well as other stakeholders, to ensure there is a fair and consistent approach across all 32 Local Authorities throughout Scotland to aid this recovery. Preventing alcohol fuelled violence, disorder and antisocial behaviour remains a priority for Police Scotland and I believe that working together we can reduce this through early intervention and enforcement.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our local partnerships and the good work they carry out. With their support Police Scotland and partners can continue to drive improvements in licensing. I will continue to ensure that all officers and staff recognise the importance of working together with key partners, including the Licensing Trade, in an effort to improve licensing standards nationally.

#### Police Scotland Licensing Overview -

The Violence Prevention and Licensing Co-ordination Unit (VPLCU) sits within Safer Communities based at Dalmarnock Police Station, Glasgow.

The VPLCU upholds the two tier structure for licensing which supports both national and local priorities through service delivery. They have overall responsibility for determining and delivering national licensing strategy and policy, by providing advice, guidance and support to divisional licensing teams as well as undertaking other specialist functions.

The Violence Prevention and Licensing Co-ordination Unit is a specialist department which consists of a small team of officers, based in Glasgow. The officers within the unit work with divisional licensing teams and partner agencies to help shape policy and strategy around the police licensing function. They provide practical and tactical advice to police licensing practitioners, operational officers, supervisors and policing commanders.

#### **NOT PROTECTIVELY MARKED**

The VPLCU seek to ensure that legislation governing the sale and supply of alcohol is applied consistently across the country and all opportunities are taken to stop the illegal or irresponsible sale, supply or consumption of alcohol with the intention of preventing and reducing crime and disorder.

During 2021/2022, from a licensing perspective, our particular focus was on the following;

- Scrutiny of the serious incidents of violence, disorder and antisocial behaviour linked to licensed premises.
- Working closely with Licenced Premises and Scottish Government to navigate the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic through the 4Es approach by engaging, explaining, educating and enforcing.
- Governance and ongoing development of the National ICT Licensing System, known as "Inn Keeper", to increase the efficiency and effectiveness of liquor and civic licensing administration and management. Police Scotland are currently working on upgrade to the National ICT system to ensure compliance with GDPR legislation.

Each of the 13 Local Policing Divisions have a licensing team responsible for the day to day management of licensing administration, complying with statutory requirements as well as addressing any issues that may arise within licensed premises in their local area.

#### LICENSING BOARD AREA

The Licensing Board area is policed by South Ayrshire Sub-Division. Chief Superintendent Faroque Hussain is the Local Police Commander who has the responsibility for all day-to-day policing functions.

### **Local Policing Priorities**

Following our public consultation process, the policing priorities for South Ayrshire Sub-Division as set out in our Local Policing Plan area as follows:

#### **Description of Board Area**

There are a total of 388 Licensed Premises in South Ayrshire: 106 On-Sales 165 On/Off Sales 117 Off-Sales

### **OPERATION OF THE LICENSING (SCOTLAND) ACT 2005**

Alcohol pervades across a wide range of issues in our society and, as you know, is often a factor in violence, domestic abuse and anti-social behaviour; incidents that the Police Service of Scotland deals with every day in each area of the country. Therefore, licensed premises are carefully monitored with all incidents in and around such premises scrutinised to ensure compliance with the licensing objectives, resulting in a greater knowledge and understanding of potential problematic premises.

A problem solving approach is implemented in conjunction with the Premises Licence Holder and Designated Premises Managers. Premises that continue to fall below expected standards can be subject of formal police interventions and in some cases, a review being submitted to the Licensing Board.

Ayrshire Divisional Licensing Department utilises the Innkeeper database to highlight monitored and problematic premises, this allows our officers to focus their attention on the premises requiring the most support and attention.

#### **Board Decisions**

#### **Application for Review of Licence**

In the South Ayrshire Board Area during the reporting year, there have been two premises licence reviews submitted to the South Ayrshire Licensing Board by Police Scotland.

# **Applications for Premises Licences and Licence Variations**

#### **NOT PROTECTIVELY MARKED**

All applications for premises licences and licence variations are carefully considered in line with current policy and legislation, paying particular attention to the Licensing Objectives. There have been no objections submitted to South Ayrshire Licensing Board by Police Scotland.

#### **Personal Licences**

Personal licences are carefully considered by Ayrshire Division Licensing in line with policy and legislation before being returned to the local authority. In the reporting period, there have been two objections submitted to South Ayrshire Licensing Board by Police Scotland.

#### **Formal Police Interventions**

Our focus is to improve the safety and wellbeing of people, places and communities in South Ayrshire by focusing on keeping people safe. This is done by local officers who are proactively identifying and addressing concerns regarding licensed premises at an early stage. Through early intervention and working in partnership with Designated Premise Managers and Premise Licence Holders, areas of concern have been successfully resolved without the requirement for a premises or personal licence review.

There is only one premises within the South Ayrshire Board Area that have been subject of a formal intervention agreement in the reporting year. These agreements are entered into between Premises Licence Holders and Police Scotland and set out areas in which improvement could be made. Each agreement is monitored and reviewed within a specific timescale to ensure that the necessary improvements have been implemented.

The formal intervention process should result in an improvement in standards and practices. The process also ensures that Police Scotland utilises a fair and evidence based approach prior to pursuing a formal review of a Premises Licence if agreed terms are not being complied with or if there are recurring issues.

# PREVENTING THE SALE OR SUPPLY OF ALCOHOL TO CHILDREN OR YOUNG PEOPLE

In South Ayrshire there have been no reports submitted to the Procurator Fiscal for contravention of Section 102 of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005, which relates to the sale of alcohol to a child or young person.

Locality Policing and campus officers are exploring the possibilities of returning the Test Purchase Scheme that was previously delivered and was an effective tool to address such issues when they were identified within our communities.

#### TACKLING SERIOUS AND ORGANISED CRIME

#### **NOT PROTECTIVELY MARKED**

Serious and Organised Crime (SOCG) presents a clear threat to the Ayrshire Licensing trade and legitimate economy. As a result, Ayrshire Division continues to target known criminality in this area as well as attempting to reduce the opportunity for individuals to exploit legitimate licensing opportunities for their own illegitimate means.

Licensing staff work closely with Divisional Intelligence teams to explore intervention opportunities against Serious and Organised Crime Groups.

At this current time, there is 4 Serious Organised Crime Group being managed by Ayrshire Division with this group having a known interest in a business requiring some form of licence to operate. Not all groups are based in South Ayrshire but they all operate on a pan-Ayrshire basis.

This involvement in the licensing trade is often a direct result of the expertise or experience of an individual from their group in that business sector, and/or the chosen business, providing an ability to launder criminal proceeds.

Officers in South Ayrshire continue to carry out targeted premises visits whenever possible to ensure that all license conditions are being complied with. Such visits will also involve a range of partner agencies including;

HMRC, DVSA, DVLA, Scottish Power, SEPA, South Ayrshire Council, SIA and others.

Within South Ayrshire, continued scrutiny of problematic premises has in the past had positive results. Licensed premises throughout Ayrshire usually positively engage with Police by not only reporting incidents that occur within the Licensed Premise, but incidents that occur out with the premise, ensuring public safety.

#### **DIVISIONAL LICENSING**

Officers within South Ayrshire continued to submit details of inspections of licenced premises on the Inn Keeper system to ensure on and off sale activity was captured. These highlighted positive and negative incidents and assisted in identifying problematic premises and good practices.

Interrogating of police systems assists in identifying individuals connected with the licensing process who are involved in criminality and allow for appropriate early intervention.

Divisional licensing staff monitor reported offences on licensed premises ensuring exclusion order requests are included in police reports for consideration by the courts.

#### **NOT PROTECTIVELY MARKED**

In 2021 South Ayrshire locality Inspectors along with the local authority licensing standards officer implemented meetings with the licensing trade. These meetings have been well received and allow for the opportunity to discuss any concerns, emerging issues as well as offering prevention and re-assurance messages. These planned meetings will continue throughout 2022/23.

#### PROPOSED ACTIVITY FOR THE YEAR AHEAD

South Ayrshire Sub-Division will continue to focus on "Keeping People Safe" and will work collaboratively with the licensed trade, partners and local communities to improve standards and compliance across the licensed trade and actively targeting;

- excess alcohol consumption
- vulnerability due to excess alcohol consumption
- sale and supply of alcohol to children and young people
- incidents of crime and offending connected to sale of alcohol

#### **Operation Inver**

Operation Inver is a partnership approach to ensure a focussed and proportionate response to support the night time economy in South Ayrshire.

The overarching objective during this time will be to Keep People Safe. The following strategy is implemented for this operation:

- Maximise the safety of the public.
- Minimise disruption to the local communities.
- Ensure public order is maintained, addressing alcohol related violence and antisocial behaviour, particularly in and around licensed premises.
- Ensure licensed premises comply with the current legislation.
- Ensure positive and negative interactions with licensed premises are accurately logged.

Officers are tasked with specific duties including visits to licensed premises to ensure that licensing legislation and responsibilities expected by managers and staff as contained within their license is complied with, and that any instances of anti-social behavior in and around licensed premises is dealt with accordingly.

In engaging members of the public the policing style adopted is friendly and engaging whilst robustly dealing with any instances of anti-social behaviour.

Operation Inver is further enhanced on Saturday nights with the deployment of Taxi marshals. Street pastors and St Andrews Ambulance.

FOCUS ON VULNERABILITY AND DUTY OF CARE IN THE NIGHT TIME ECONOMY – Bystander Training.

#### **NOT PROTECTIVELY MARKED**

Divisional Licensing staff are due to commence Bystander training in South Ayrshire in May 2022. This is training offered to Licensed premises to raise the awareness of preventing incidents of vulnerability and related crime, promoting safety by identifying the signs of vulnerability at the earliest opportunity, minimising the risk to themselves or members of the public by:

- Understanding what Vulnerability is
- Recognise the impact factors
- Identify those who may be vulnerable
- Understanding what our duty of care is
- Practical information

#### NATIONAL PERSPECTIVE

Our priorities and policing plans continue to be shaped by the objectives contained within the Scottish Government's Strategic Objectives and National Outcomes and the Strategic Police Plan that are delivered locally through single outcome agreements.

Consultation and engagement is combined with our own analysis of the issues likely to impact on the safety of the public to inform our local and national strategic assessments which identify our priorities and provide a firm evidence base for local policing teams across Scotland to deliver operational plans to prevent crime and disorder and keep people safe.

#### Our National Priorities are:

- Violence Disorder and Anti-social Behaviour
- Serious Organised Crime
- Road Safety and Road Crime
- Protecting People at Risk of Harm
- Counter Terrorism

To conclude we would like to thank you for your continued support during what has been a challenging year for all. We have all had to adapt to a new way of working and ever changing circumstances which has been embraced by all.

We look forward to a safe and healthy 2022/2023.

**Subject: Revocation of Personal Licences** 

#### 1. Purpose

To advise members on the revocations of personal licences.

#### 2. Recommendation

To note the terms of the report

#### 3. Background

The Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 introduced personal licences. It is a condition of the personal licence that (a) the applicant undertakes refresher training within five years of the date of issue of the licence and (b) no later than 3 months after the expiry of five years from the date of issue produces evidence of the training to the Board. Failure to complete either part of the process means that the Board must revoke the personal licence. (Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 section 87(3)

#### 4. Current Position

Since the last report to the Board, a further 6 personal licences as per appendix 1 have been revoked under delegated powers. All licence holders affected have been advised by post to their last known address of the revocation of their licences. Revoked licence holders can still take refresher training and then reapply for another personal licence although there is a cost of £50 for the new application. (There is no fee payable if the refresher training is completed and intimated to the Board on time.)

#### **APPLICATION REPORT**

#### 1. Background:

An application for a provisional premises licence for a retail shop.

The core hours sought are 10:00-22:00 daily for off sales only.

The premises currently operate as a tobacconist store and wish to have a small, specialist alcohol offering to complement this.

The applicant is seeking an alcohol display area of 9.14 square metres which has been agreed with Building Standards.

The Board must, in considering and determining the application consider whether any of the grounds for refusal applies and-

- (A) if none of them applies, the Board must grant the application, or
- (B) if any of them applies, the Board must refuse the application.

The grounds for refusal are—

- (a) that the subject premises are excluded premises. Excluded premises are defined as premises used as a garage or which form part of premises which are so used. Premises are used as a garage if they are used for one or more of the following-
- (b) the sale by retail of petrol or derv
- (c) the sale of motor vehicles, or
- (d) the maintenance of motor vehicles
  - However, premises used for the sale by retail of petrol or derv, or which form part of premises so used, are not excluded premises if persons resident in the locality in which the premises are situated are, or are likely to become , reliant to a significant extent on the premises as the principal source of -
  - (i)petrol or derv, or
  - (ii)groceries (where the premises are, or are to be, used also for the sale by retail of groceries).
- (C) that the application must be refused under section 25(2), 64(2) or 65(3),
- (D) that the Licensing Board considers that the granting of the application would be inconsistent with one or more of the licensing objectives,
- (E) that, having regard to-
- (i) the nature of the activities proposed to be carried on in the subject premises,
- (ii) the location, character and condition of the premises, and
- (iii) the persons likely to frequent the premises,
- the Board considers that the premises are unsuitable for use for the sale of alcohol,
- (e) that, having regard to the number and capacity of-
- (i) licensed premises, or
- (ii) licensed premises of the same or similar description as the subject premises,
- in the locality in which the subject premises are situated, the Board considers that, if the application were to be granted, there would, as a result, be overprovision of licensed premises, or licensed premises of that description, in the locality.


