Reshaping care for older people in South Ayrshire

August 2012

Welcome to the fifth edition of 'Reshaping care for older people in South Ayrshire'.

The last issue featured news about services we were introducing, such as community wards and enablement.

What's happened so far?

Here are just some of the new Change Fund related initiatives...

We have introduced a new service 'hub' at Biggart Hospital in Prestwick. This 'hub' enables health and social work staff to work together in the same place.

The hub is the base for staff from the Integrated Care and Enablement Services (IC&ES) team (see panel), the community ward, district nurse team leaders and 12 social work staff. This 'hub' will serve the north part of South Ayrshire, while Girvan Community Hospital will be the base for a 'hub' for the south of the county.

Intermediate Care and Enablement Services (IC&ES)

As part of our plans for reshaping care for older people, NHS Ayrshire & Arran and the three local authorities have redesigned the existing Rapid Response Service.

The new IC&ES is made up of health and social care staff from a range of disciplines, as well as private and voluntary agencies. They work in partnership to provide short-term support for people with conditions

that can safely be managed at home or in a community setting. They can offer an alternative to hospital admission and help with an early or supported discharge. The aim is to give patients the best possible chance for long term independence, choice and quality of life. This in turn will help to reduce the need for ongoing support from health or council services and reduce the number of times someone may have to visit hospital.

The teams are spread throughout the three local authority areas, but have a single point of contact. The bases for South Ayrshire are in the Biggart Hospital and Girvan Community Hospital.

The Community Ward is now up and running. The Community Ward team; made up of a GP, Advanced Nurse Practitioner and Administrator, is based in the health and social work 'hub' at Biggart Hospital and works closely with the other staff there. The team will focus on working with local GPs to help care for patients with complex needs to support them in their own homes and to reduce the risk of unplanned hospital care.

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Support for people with dementia

Support for people suffering from dementia and their carers is at the heart of Reshaping care. As well as initiatives like telecare, Community Ward, pharmacy support and Integrated Care and Enablement, we are also introducing a range of other services which are targeted towards helping people with dementia. These include:

- Dementia Liaison Nurses we have two liaison nurses in place in South Ayrshire to support care homes. These nurses will help the care home support their residents with dementia
- A training officer whose role is to provide wider access to dementia awareness raising and training
- A post-diagnosis nurse is being recruited to support people during the crucial time when they are newly diagnosed with dementia

Improving support for people after they have been diagnosed with dementia is one of the two key improvements areas in Scotland's National Dementia Strategy published in June 2010.

The five 'pillars' of support for someone who has just been diagnosed with dementia, as described by Alzheimer Scotland, are:

- help to understand the illness and manage symptoms
- support to stay connected to the community
- peer support
- help with future decision-making
- developing a personalised care plan for their future care.

It is proposed that from 2013:

· all people who are newly diagnosed will

receive a guaranteed support

- this means they will receive at least one year of post-diagnostic support, including a support plan which is centred around each individual patient and would aim to meet all of the five 'pillars'
- support will be provided by a named person/link worker.

South Ayrshire has been invited to be one of three test sites in Scotland to explore how we can meet and achieve these aims.

Carers' supports

The Scottish Government has stressed the importance of using some of the Change Fund to support unpaid carers.

The South Ayrshire Carers Centre, based in Ayr, is the main focus for support for carers. The Centre provides a range of support, information and advice for carers in South Ayrshire. The Change Fund has also funded the recruitment of two dedicated workers to support older carers. These workers will be able to offer one-to-one and group support, health checks and alternative therapies, financial assessment and short breaks/respite. News in brief

- Change Fund 2012/13
 - The Change Fund plan for 2012/13 was submitted to Scottish Government on 17 February.
 - From the 2011/12 plans, additional funding has been put towards:
 - More nursing cover for out-ofhours (after 5pm and before 9am)
 - Investment to get enablement working in Ayr
- Joint Strategy for Older People (Commissioning)
 - NHS Ayrshire & Arran and East, North and South Ayrshire Councils are working in partnership with voluntary groups and charities to produce a 10 year Joint Strategy for Older People
 - This has to be submitted to Scottish Government by the end of March 2013. A Programme Board has now been established to lead this process
 - Throughout 2012 groups will have a range of opportunities to influence and shape this document
 - There will be a special Ayrshire-wide newsletter produced shortly giving more detail about this

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
